It is revealed in Arabic and divided into 114 chapters.

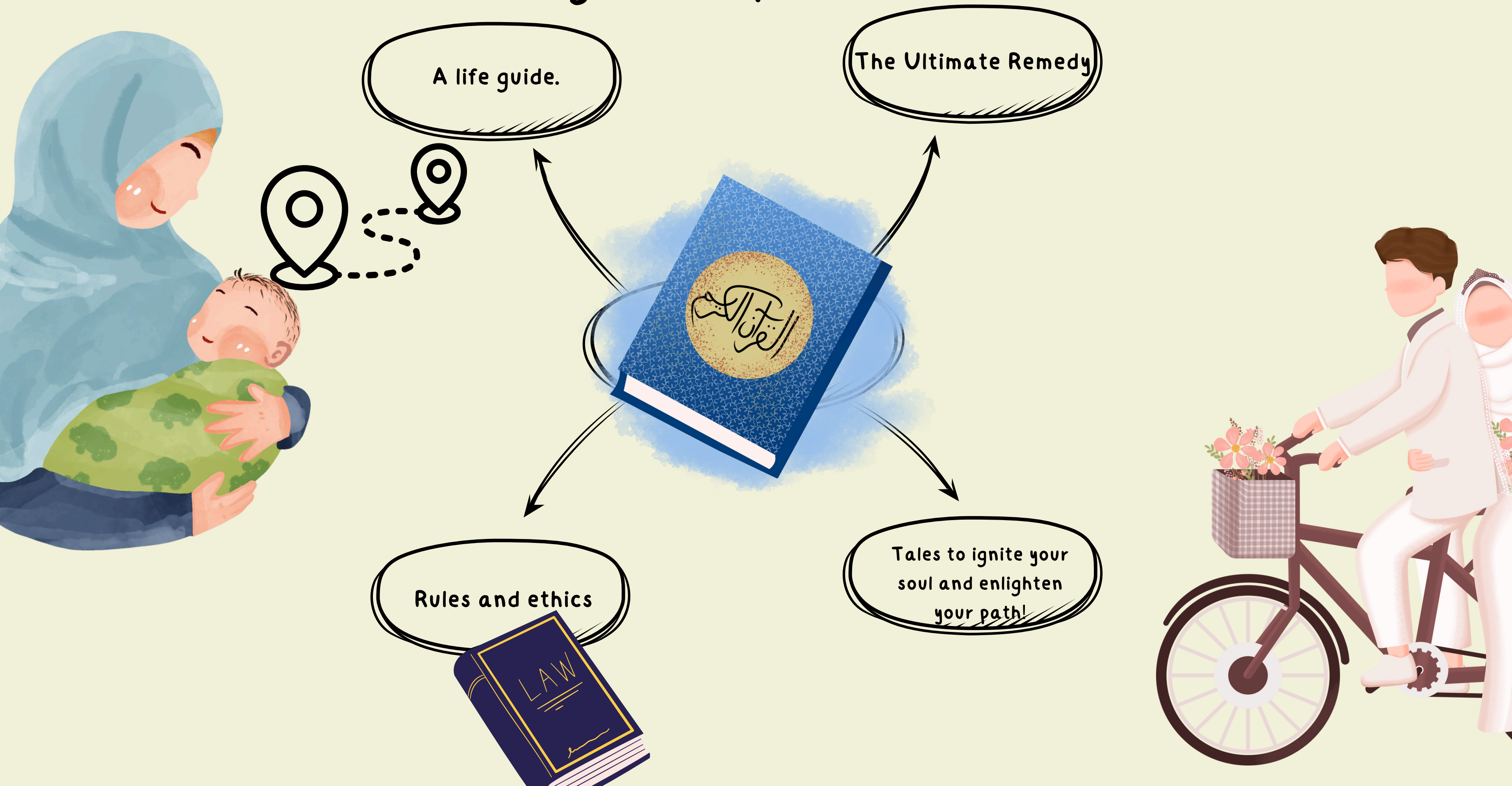
Teaching and Values

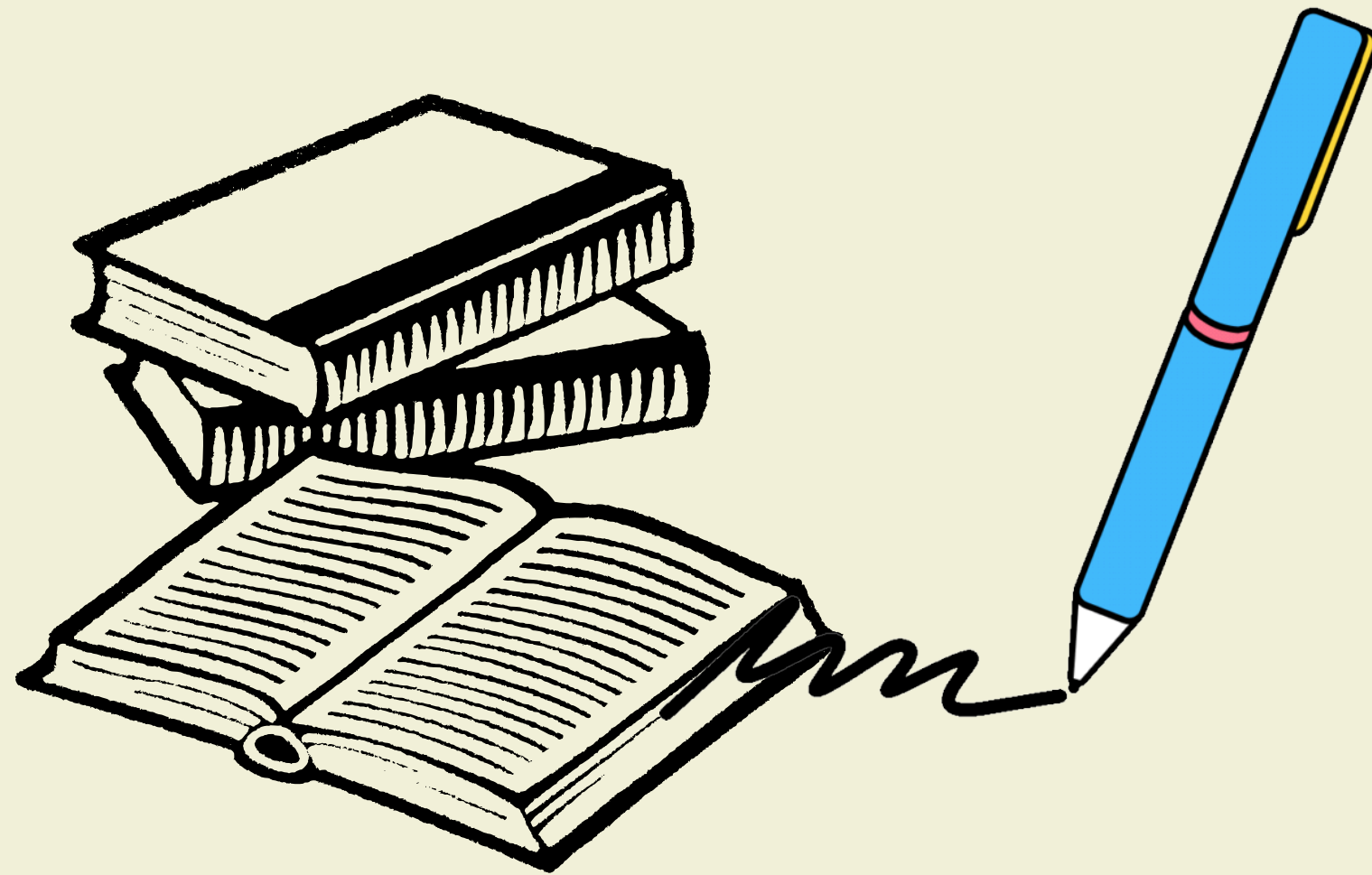
The Quran teaches about Belief in One God, compassion, honesty, forgiveness and other values, morals, laws, reward and punishments.

01

Forgiveness

Quran 24:22: "And let them pardon and overlook. Would you not like that Allah should forgive you? And Allah is Forgiving and Merciful."

Kindness

Quran 17:23: "And your Lord has decreed that you not worship except Him, and to parents, good treatment. Whether one or both of them reach old age [while] with you, say not to them [so much as], 'uff,' and do not repel them but speak to them a noble word."

Justice

Quran 16:90: "Indeed, Allah orders justice and good conduct and giving to relatives and forbids immorality and bad conduct and oppression. He admonishes you that perhaps you will be reminded."



Moral conduct

Fulfilling Promises:

Quran 2:177: "It is not righteousness that you turn your faces towards the east or the west, but righteousness is in one who believes in Allah, the Last Day, the Angels, the Book, and the Prophets, and gives his wealth, despite love for it, to relatives, orphans, the needy, the traveller, those who ask [for help], and for freeing slaves."

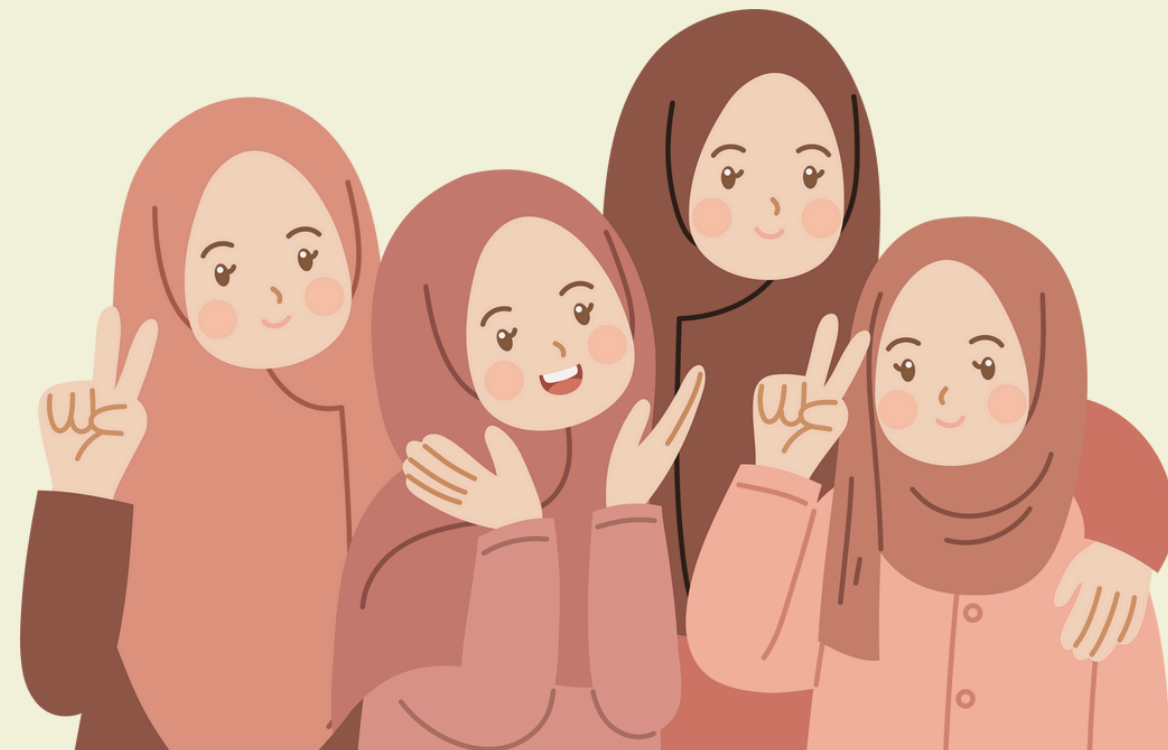
Explanation: This verse emphasizes the importance of fulfilling promises and commitments, even if it requires sacrificing one's interests or desires

Truthfulness in Speech:

Quran 33:70: "O you who have believed, fear Allah and speak words of appropriate justice."

Explanation: This verse encourages believers to speak truthfully and justly in all their interactions, reflecting the importance of honesty in communication.

Moral conduct

'Indeed, adversity has touched me, and You are the Most Merciful of the merciful.' So We responded to him and removed what afflicted him of adversity. And We gave him [back] his family and the like thereof with them as a mercy from Us and a reminder for the worshippers [of Allah]."

Explanation: This story teaches children the importance of remaining patient and trusting in Allah's mercy during difficult times.

Enduring Tests and Trials (Quran 2:155-157):

Example: Believers are tested with various trials, and those who remain patient receive Allah's mercy and reward.

Quranic Verse: "And We will surely test you with something of fear and hunger and a loss of wealth and lives and fruits, but give good tidings to the patient, Who, when disaster strikes them, say, 'Indeed we belong to Allah, and indeed to Him we will return.' Those are the ones upon whom are blessings from their Lord and mercy. And it is those who are the [rightly] guided."

Surah Al-'Alaq (Quran 96:1-5):

Educational Value

"Read in the name of your Lord who created - Created man from a clinging substance. Read, and your Lord is the most Generous - Who taught by the pen - Taught man that which he knew not."

Seek Knowledge

Explanation: This passage highlights the command to read and acquire knowledge, recognizing the importance of education and learning as a means of understanding Allah's creation and His wisdom.

Surah An-Nahl (Quran 16:78):

- "And Allah has extracted you from the wombs of your mothers not knowing a thing, and He made for you hearing and vision and intellect that perhaps you would be grateful."
- Explanation: This verse highlights the intellect bestowed upon humans by Allah as a means of acquiring knowledge and understanding, emphasizing the importance of using one's faculties for learning and gratitude.

Educational Value

Critical thinking and reflection

Surah Al-Anbiya (Quran 21:30):

- "Have those who disbelieved not considered that the heavens and the earth were a joined entity, and We separated them and made from water every living thing? Then will they not believe?"
- **Explanation:** This verse encourages reflection and contemplation on the natural world, prompting individuals to seek knowledge about the creation of the heavens and the earth, which serves as a form of education and understanding of Allah's signs.

Surah Ar-Rum (Quran 30:22):

- "And of His signs is the creation of the heavens and the earth and the diversity of your languages and colours. Indeed in that are signs for those of knowledge."
- **Explanation:** This verse highlights the diversity in languages and colours as signs of Allah's creation, inviting people to ponder these signs and acquire knowledge through observation and reflection.

Educational Value

Surah Al-An'am (Quran 6:96): "He (Allah) is the cleaver of daybreak and has made the night for rest and the sun and moon for calculation. That is the determination of the Exalted in Might, the Knowing."

While this verse specifically mentions the sun and the moon, the Quran also mentions the celestial bodies in other verses. However, it's essential to note that the Quran primarily focuses on the signs of Allah's creation and His power rather than detailed scientific descriptions. Therefore, the Quranic verses on celestial bodies often serve to highlight the wonders of the universe and the greatness of the Creator.

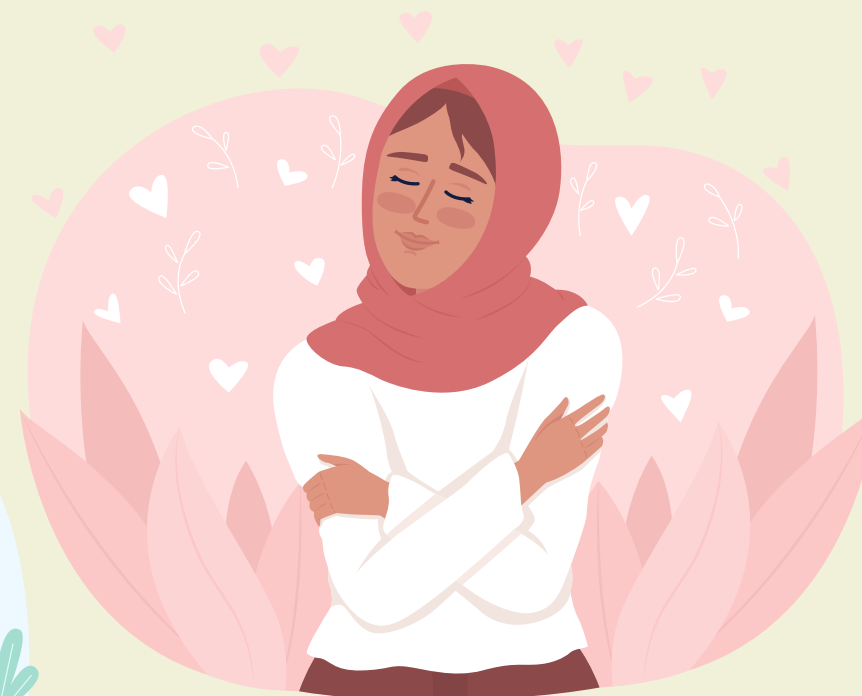
